March Speaker:

Spring Spawn Bass Fishing at Lake Fork with Johnny Walker



Long-time club member Johnny Walker, will be our March speaker and sharing his vast knowledge of bass fishing and Lake Fork, the bass capital of Texas. His presentation is entitled "Fly Fishing the Largemouth Bass Spawn at Lake Fork." Bass fishing on Lake Fork is an amazing experience year round, but the spring spawn? It can be epic! Johnny will share techniques on how to catch the bass of a lifetime on a fly rod.

Johnny started guiding on Lake Fork part time back in the late 90s as an extra when Brian Gamble needed an extra boat to help with one or two too many clients. He has 'unofficially' guided many friends and family members since then. Johnny says he has always enjoyed teaching people how to fish and watching their face light up when they catch that first fish or, what they consider a fish of a lifetime.

After he retired from 35 years in the aerospace industry, Johnny officially started a guide service, Red's Lake Fork Fly Fishing Adventures, on Lake Fork, a lake he has been fishing since 1996. He holds the lake's record for catching bass on a fly rod—a 9.25 lb. beauty. The overall lake record, which is also the state record, is 18.18 pounds, so the state record bass could be there!

"So, what's different about me that the other 500 bass fishing guides at lake fork? The main thing is I fly fish and my guide service will be based on fly fishing for bass, teaching people how to use a fly rod and bass flies to catch large bass and, to take experienced fly fishers out for the chance to catch a bass of a lifetime," says Johnny.

He grew up in Oklahoma and learned to fish following my dad & uncle up and down the streams, creeks, and rivers of southeastern

Oklahoma around Broken Bow. One of them would carry a casting rod with conventional lures, like the old Lucky 13. The other would carry a fly rod with all kinds of strange looking artificial bugs (flies). They would wade through a long hole, each casting their own specific gear. When they got to the end of the hole they would trade off gear and fish the next hole. They would repeat this all day long. At the end of the day, they would tally up how many fish were caught on the different fishing gear. He says that surprisingly, the fly rod won the day as many times as the conventional gear.

March Quick Clinic: Streamside First Aid

Arrive early to the meeting to attend the Quick Clinic, a twenty minute clinic on a variety of topics such as like fly choice, photo tips, first aid, and so on.

Beginning at 6:40 p.m. at our March meeting, join Dr. Bill Hoot, M.D. and Certified Casting Instructor, who will be discuss some first aid tips including hook removal. This will be a very informative clinic with info we all need to learn to be prepared for whatever may happen on the water.

Come to Our Free Kayak Clinic

As part of our club's Fly Fishing 101 educational series, we're doing a special clinic in March called Kayak 101 that will incorporate learning skills for fishing from a kayak. This event will take place beginning at 9:00 a.m. until noon on Saturday, March 18 at the Panther Pavilion boathouse that is operated by Backwoods. It is located on the banks of the Trinity River at 480 North Taylor. The clinic is free and will be in lieu of our March outing. Members are encouraged to come and bring friends.

There will be kayaks available for those who don't own one, and instructors will be on the river bank teaching basic paddling techniques, getting in and out of the kayak. Our club volunteers will also teach basic casting skills for those who need entry level casting help, as well as folks to teach warm water techniques for sunfish and largemouth bass. If you have your own equipment and waders/boots, please bring them. If you are new to the sport or a beginner, the club has some rods and reels to use for the clinic.

Due to warm weather, the fish have been turning on as of late, with some bass on the beds, so we expect the potential good catch for beginners. Everyone who plans to fish will need a valid

Texas fishing license.

March Fishing Report

Spring is a great time for bass, crappie and sand bass, as their annual spawn happens. And this year's early Spring and warmerthan-normal temperatures look to provide a longer Spring fishing season this year. Stephen Woodcock, Fishing Manager at Backwoods in Fort Worth, has provided some "intel" on where the fishing is happening right now and expected to be in March.

Sand Bass Run

The blooming of the red buds and March bring the Sand Bass run as they move up into the creeks that feed major lakes to spawn. Given our early Spring temperatures, an earlier run as begun. Reports are coming on Nolan River near Blum with some good days, with lots of fish caught, to other days where it is tougher fishing as the temperatures have go up and down. Same is true for Marshall Creek off Hwy. 377. Also reports of good sand bass fishing is coming in for the Brazos below DeCordova Dam (Granbury). And, if you want to make a trip southeast to the Sabine River, there are some monster sand bass being caught there.



Crane flies as indicators are working well as Well as Clauser patterns in white/gray or white/chartreuse.

Bass Spawn in Warm Water Lakes

Reports are coming in from East Texas that the bass spawn

is starting earlier on the warm water lakes (those that have electricity power plants). The warm water combined with the warm temps are triggering the spawn. Lakes that are reporting good bass fishing are Monticello and Fairfield.

Brazos River below Possum Kingdom

After a spectacular January, February fishing was spotty even with some water releases. Fishing there seems to be slowing a bit.

Blue River, OK

The Blue River seems to be fishing good, with trout still to be caught.

White River, near Cotter, AR

If you want to hunt for monster-sized brown trout, fish as night! Yes, people do night fish the White with mice patterns, and the White is on fire, according to reports.

April Outing: Bill Ward's Ranch

This is one of our club's favorite place to fish, and what a special place it is: Bill Ward's beautiful gravel quarry lakes west of Mexia. The outing is April 21-23.

This is a camping trip for those who want to come for the weekend. There will be a place for RV's, but limited hookups. Otherwise it will be tent camping. There will be a portapotty. For those who don't want to camp, there is a Best Western and a Comfort inn in Mexia.

Reasons to go: It is an easy drive from Fort Worth or Dallas. These gravel quarry lakes are filled with fish (big bass and perch). The water is amazingly clear and clean. More details at the March meeting.

Make Plans to Attend May Outing Weekend at Caddo Lake

The Club's May outing will be a trip out to East Texas to the fabled Caddo Lake, May 19-21. Frank Huneycut will be the outing coordinator and contact.

Known for its Spanish Moss draped cypress trees, Caddo Lake sits on the Texas/Louisiana border north of Marshall and is the only natural lake in Texas. This will be a kayak/canoe outing as bank and wade fishing is difficult Species to target are largemouth bass, yellow bass, crappie, and bream.

We are staying at the Shady Glade Resort, which sits on the

lake in Uncertain, Texas. The Shady Glade Resort has a 5-unit motel, 3 mobile homes, and a three small cabins. At this time, the Club has reserved 2 mobile homes and have already filled them. Shady Glade also has a cafe and marina. If there are more people interested in the trip, please let Frank know soon, and he will see if we reserve another facility at Shady Glade. Lodging will cost approximately \$85/person.

The RV Park at Shady Glade has year around tenants and does not have any spots available, but if you are looking at the RV option, Backwater Jacks RV Park is nearby as is Caddo Lake State Park which has a variety of cabins, tent sites, and RV hookups.

There are also plans to Saturday night at Big Pine Lodge, famous for its catfish and jalapeno hush puppies.

FlyFish Texas

A perennial favorite for many years is FlyFish Texas, sponsored by Texas Parks & Wildlife at the Fresh Water Fisheries Center in Athens, Texas. From 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., anglers from novice to expert will gather at TFFC to celebrate the sport of flyfishing. Learn the basics of fly-tying and casting, then fish for rainbow trout in our on-site ponds and streams. Attend seminars and demonstrations led by fly-fishing professionals. Visit with vendors of fly-fishing services and equipment. The TFFC pond will be freshly stocked with trout so visitors can fish.

Our club will be working with other Fly-fishing clubs from across Texas to help with the event. Specifically, we'll be co-running the casting clinics. Fly of the Month- "The Spruce Moth" (Western Moth) Choristoneura Occidentalis



This month's fly of the month comes to us from the tying desk of Dutch Baughman. Most of you know Dutch, but for those of you who do not, he's our Regional Director for the International Fly Fishers Federation (Northern district of the Texas Council) and is an active member of both the FWFF and the Dallas club. He lived in Oregon as part of his coaching career and became an avid steelheader (anadromous rainbow trout, i.e. ocean run rainbows) while living there. He travels often to the Pacific Northwest to pursue his passion and is a great resource for anyone interested in Stealheading and Steelhead flies (as well as Classic Atlantic Salmon flies).

The Spruce Moth (Western Moth) Choristoneura Occidentalis

For many years, a very popular hatch in Montana has been the Spruce Moth. This hatch is very limited, being evident only from only mid-August to October, and typically between early morning, and early afternoon. When the Spruce Moth hatch occurs, the fish activity is frenetic!

The experience I personally had turns out to be very typical of so many people who visit Montana, and return home to fish the local fisheries (fresh and warm water). While fishing our local water, I reached in my fly box for an elk hair caddis type of pattern, and saw the Spruce Moth fly from a recent visit to Montana. I tied on the Spruce Moth, and the result was spectacular! So for many years, I have kept a great supply of the Spruce Moth in my fly box (and no Elk Hair Caddis), for use while fishing in Montana, but now locally, to use anytime I would normally be tying on an Elk Hair Caddis or Stimulator.

The reaction of Bass and local trout has proven to be consistent and reliable with this fly.

The Spruce Moth is typically tied on a size 10 to 14 dry fly hook, but they are also very handy on a wet fly hook. The color for this fly is best in cream, white, or pale yellow. The natural Spruce Moth is not an aquatic bug, but instead a parasitic moth, found in Spruce trees*. The Spruce Moth has an attraction to water, and will frequently land on the water, like a terrestrial pattern. There is also a good population of the Spruce Moth throughout the Rocky Mountain States, and particularly in western and southwestern Colorado. Like so many fly patterns, there are variants to the fundamental pattern, and the Spruce Moth version shown here is the fundamental pattern, as used by Bob Jacklin in West Yellowstone, Montana.

Whether you are fishing near Spruce trees or Mesquite, try the Spruce Moth at any time you would normally use an Elk Hair Caddis or Stimulator pattern.

Recipe:

Thread: cream, white, or pale yellow

Hook: size 10 (10-14)

Wing: elk hair, cream, white, or pale yellow

Body: dubbing (tan, or cream), hackle (cream, white, pale

yellow, or ginger)

*Spruce budworms work on a one-year life cycle, The eggs are deposited in the tops of trees in mid-August. By late September, the immature larvae hatch. They don't feed during winter, they just spend their time in a silken case. In the early spring, just as the buds are developing and expanding, the larvae leave their cases and bore into the buds or feed on foliage. Spruce moths typically feed until the early part of July before they pupate and become adults. This happens over a two-week period. During warm years it may happen earlier, and during cold years it happens later. Typically, they are ready to fly by early August. Once airborne, they mate and then deposit eggs.


Tying Instructions:



1). After de-barbing the hook, this is a size 10, TMC 200R. Begin the thread wrap directly above the hook point, and wrap toward the hook bend with touching wraps. Stop wrapping when your thread hangs directly above where

the barb would be. (For purpose of this instruction I am using red thread to enhance visibly; red thread can be used for this portion of the fly, but normally, I would begin with white or cream colored thread.)



2). Cut a small bundle of red deer hair. Tie in the bundle directly above where the barb would be. Tightly hold the bundle in your left hand as you begin to wrap thread toward the eye; tightly holding the deer hair bundle reduces the tendency for

the bundle to flair as you wrap the thread,d and helps to keep the bundle on top of the hook shank. Continue edge-to-edge wraps of thread toward the eye until the deer hair bundle is covered. Cut the deer hair bundle directly above the bend of the hook. This is the egg sack.

3). Here, I changed the thread to white. Advance the thread to the hook eye, and be sure the thread is as close to the eye as you can get. Cut a bundle of cream (white or yellow) deer hair that is about 3 times as much as the egg sack bundle. Stack the deer



hair, then measure the length of deer hair so the tips are at the hook eye, and the butt ends are directly above where the barb would be (this length of deer hair will be the length of the hook shank). Tie in this bundle of deer hair that is a hook shank length where your thread is hanging at the hook eye. Once tied in, the wing of deer hair will be the length of the hook shank. Tightly hold the deer hair bundle butts and wrap thread back toward the bend of the hook until the deer hair bundle is covered.



4). Continue the thread toward the hook bend to the point above where the barb would be, and tie in a hackle feather. It helps to fold the hackle barbs by hand before tying in the feather. Dub a thread noodle then wrap the dubbing toward the hook eye. Be sure to

dub right up to the base of the deer hair wing.



5). You may notice the dubbing noodle gets becomes a thicker diameter toward the bottom of the noodle. This will create a tapered body

6). Wrap the hackle feather toward the hook eye. Notice the feather is wrapped with space between each wrap. Tie off at the base of the deer hair wing.






7). Position the thread about a width of the hook eye, behind the hook eye. Fold the deer hair wing toward the hook bend, and secure the wing with thread wraps, so the "bullet" head is formed, but the head should only be on top of the hook shank. Clip the hackle

barbs on the bottom of the fly near the hook point, leaving a few of the hackle barbs as a collar or legs. Whip finish.

The instructions below pertain to the You Tube video by Bob Jacklin. Note: Bob does not use a red egg sack, but instead ties in a long bundle of deer hair that becomes the egg sack and the wing. This is also a good/quick fishing fly, but the egg sack and the wing are the same bundle of deer hair, so the egg sack may be too big, and the wing may be too small.

Tying instructions:

- 1. Tie in bundle of elk hair very close to the eye;
- 2. Spiral wrap a "pontoon" body back to the hook barb;
- 3. Cut elk hair to form an egg sack at the bend of the hook;
- 4. Tie in hackle in front of egg sack;
- 5. Dub the body from the egg sack to the wing;
- 6. Palmer the hackle forward to the wing;
- 7. Pull the wing backwards toward the bend of the hook, keeping the elk hair wing on the top and sides of the body
- 8. With secure wraps, form the bullet head;
- 9. Trim the hackle from the bottom of the fly
- 10. Whip finish
