May Speaker *Rus Schwausch*



On May 1, Rus Schwausch (pronounced “ss-wow-sh”) of EPIC Angling & Adventure will be here to tell us about two fishing destinations-of-a-lifetime located in remote Alaska – Alaska Wilderness SAFARI and Alaska Wilderness OUTPOST.

Alaska Wilderness SAFARI, the more sophisticated operation, is written up in the book *Fifty Places to Fly Fish Before You Die* as “arguably the most isolated coastal fishing camp in Alaska and one of the best places in the world to pursue chrome-bright, ocean-fresh salmon.” But if you want, there’s a lot more to do than just fish. This eco-diverse destination also offers dramatic scenery, daily wildlife viewing and great day hiking options, plus helicopter fly-out fishing during their “Late” season when the silver salmon are running.

His second operation is Alaska Wilderness OUTPOST. It’s a rustic, early season camp offering excellent small stream fishing for rainbow trout, grayling, king salmon and more. Short on frills, this program is for the die-hard fisherman focused on quality fishing rather than amenities.

A little background: beginning in 1995, Rus and his buddies explored and fished remote rivers on unguided float trips over three different summers. They would fly with all their equipment to the headwaters by bush plane, then float and fish over 100 mile stretches for two weeks at a time. These trips “infected” Rus with Alaska and steered his life in a completely new direction. Giving up his full-time engineering job, he started guiding in Alaska during the summer of 2001 while continuing engineering consulting work the other 8 months back in Austin. In 2004 Rus took over the operation where he first guided, Alaska Wilderness SAFARI, and is coming up on his 18th season there.

Brazos River Clean-up Saturday May 26 Below Lake Granbury

The Fort Worth Fly Fishers in cooperation with the Pecan Fly Fishers will clean up the Brazos River below Lake Granbury (De Cordova Bend Dam) on Saturday, May 26. We will meet at Pecan Plantation residential area at 8:30 a.m. (specific location TBD). WE NEED CANOES as well as kayaks. If you have a canoe, please think about participating. There will also be plenty of clean-up that will be done on foot, so you will not need a kayak or canoe to participate.

To get to Pecan Plantation, take US 377 south out of Fort Worth toward Granbury. Turn left on FM 167/Fall Creek Highway and follow it 7 to 8 miles through Acton to the front gate of Pecan Plantation.

IMPORTANT: If you plan to attend, we need to get your name on a list for the front gate. When you get to the gate, tell the gate attendant you are attending the Brazos River Clean-up and that you are a guest of Phillip Harris (817-578-4142).

The cool thing about this is that this stretch of river is great for canoes and kayaks. It is loaded with striped bass, white bass, large-mouth bass and bream. This is your opportunity to learn how to access this part of the river below the De Cordova Bend Dam. Clean-up should end about 1 p.m., leaving you time to fish the river in the afternoon.

May Outing -- Bill Ward Ranch

It's time for another of the club's all-time favorite outings – the overnighter to Bill Ward's Ranch near Mexia. Bill wants to remove some of the population of bass, sunfish and perch, and we are just the group to do it. Camping in an RV or a tent is the easiest, but some may seek accommodation in Mexia. There are no hook-ups. Bring your own favorite eats. There will be a fish fry on Saturday night. If you have an electric filet knife, please bring it. Outing leader Dale Middleton will have the first-aid kit and directions to the nearest emergency room for any mishaps.


This is also the FWFF Perch Off. There will be recognition for Largest Bass, Most Perch by Number, Most Perch by Weight, and Total Weight for Largest Five Perch. No frozen fish or previously frozen fish will be judged. Likewise, no fish with lead shot or other unnatural alterations will be allowed, this includes Bass with earrings or other body piercings. Dale will be the final judge as to the Rules. Winner may or may not set the Rules for Next Year's Perch Off.

A belly boat, kayak or canoe is highly recommended, if not required. There are limited bank fishing opportunities. Don't forget a stringer for the fish fry. A 5-weight or 6-weight rod should handle anything in the pond. Either a floating or sinking line will do. Dale recommends nymphs, streamers, poppers, bass bugs and terrestrials to entice the fish. There have already been reported sightings of grasshoppers in the area.

Dale can answer any further questions you might have at the May 1 membership meeting.

NOTE: This is not a GPS-friendly address. Follow these directions to get there:

1. Take Interstate 35W south toward Hillsboro. Take exit 368A.
2. Go east on Texas 22/Texas 171 South.
3. Go through the towns of Bynum, Malone and Hubbard to Coolidge.
4. In Coolidge, go right on Bell Street, just past Debbie's One-Stop convenience store.
5. Go left on FM 2310.
6. Go left on CR 192.
7. Go right on CR 201 (Turns into CR 198) for one-half mile.
8. Turn left into a private driveway and look for Dale.

Brazos River Outing – Come Rain or Come Shine

Springtime in Texas always brings interesting and unpredictable weather. As the saying goes, “If you don’t like the weather in Texas, give it an hour, and it will change.”

The North Texas weather forecasters predicted rain all day on Saturday, April 26, including thunderstorms and some hail. The weather was supposed to blanket North and Central Texas. That was also the day the FFI Texas Council held a joint outing on the Brazos River, near Aquilla.

Les and I woke up that morning, and it appeared gloomy but no rain. So we decided to take a chance and make the drive to Aquilla. It’s only about an hour and 10 minutes from Arlington, and if we didn’t get on the river, I thought I might convince Les to head further south to Waco so we could channel our inner Jo and Chip Gaines and hit the Magnolia Silos.

Fortunately for Les (and our pocketbook), he wasn’t subjected to a day of shopping with me. The weather turned out pretty good. The river was low in spots making it easy wading. And the water was VERY clear, even better for sight fishing.

We saw a lot of carp, buffalo and bass swimming around. Lots of beds were around as well as male bass either guarding the nest or still trying to convince a willing female to swim by. Dutch Baughman was already in a good spot, so we stopped to fish with him. He caught a very nice white bass.

Les and I weren’t having luck with the carp, so we kept heading downstream to find more bass. The clouds were dark in the south, and we heard a faint rumble of thunder. We kept fishing. Then more thunder that was closer and a few raindrops fell. Jerry Hamon, president of the IFF Texas Council, paddled up to us from downstream and suggested it was time to get off the water as the storm clouds were moving quickly.

Les and I made it up the bank to overhanging trees as the skies opened up. We stayed on the shoreline making our way back to where we put in. But just as fast as the storm clouds came — they were gone. By now, we were on the other side of the slot we fished with Dutch. Les immediately tagged a nice spotted bass. I had lots of lookers, but no takers. By now, it was getting close to lunch, so we headed back.

Dutch, and another fellow FWFF member Miguel, had left. Jerry, Craig (from Dallas Fly Fishers), Les and I headed into town for a lunch. Les and I decided to head back to Fort Worth because I discovered I hadn’t fixed my leaky waders, and I had wet clothes. Too bad, because Jerry went back and landed a MONSTER bass, measuring at 24 inches and weighing more than 10 pounds! A contender for a Lunker Class Sharelunker. He also snagged a 32-inch gar.

So, the lessons of this day: 1) don’t listen to the weather forecasters

— take a chance; 2) take an extra set of clothes in case of leaky waders; and 3) don’t take your husband shopping.

Fly of the Month: *The Llano Bug*

The May Fly of the Month is a classic Texas fly pattern: The Llano Bug created by Kevin Hutchison. Kevin is probably best known as the author of "Fly Fishing the Texas Hill Country," but is also friends with many of the folks in FWFF. Kevin is an Orvis-endorsed guide, and with the Llano Bug he has created what many to believe one of the best patterns for catching our warm water targets.



Materials:

Hook -- Mustad 3906 size 6 - 10

Thread -- color to match foam

Overbody -- 2-mm foam cut as follows: width - hook gape; length - 2x length of hook shank

Underbody -- sparkle dubbing, color to match foam

Wing -- deer body hair

Legs -- rubber legs, color to match or complement foam color

Antennae -- rubber legs

Steps:

1. Tie In thread at bend of the hook.
2. For the antennae, tie in two rubber legs (one on each side) legs pointing toward the eye of the hook.
3. Cut yellow foam strip to a point and tie in at the hook bend.
4. Dub back half of shank with yellow sparkle dubbing.

5. Fold foam forward and tie in at midpoint, over the sparkle dubbing.

6. Wrap thread forward to one eye diameter behind the eye, binding down the foam

7. Flatten the foam with tight thread wraps from midpoint to just behind the eye.

8. Tie in forelegs fore at the eye; tie in rear legs at the mid-point. They go over the flattened foam.

9. Tie in deer hair on flattened foam spot.

9. Dub more sparkle dub over flat spot (over the ends of the deer hair and over the legs).

10. Fold foam back over flat spot, tie off at mid-fly.

11. Cut the foam, leaving a tab against deer hair beyond tie-off point.

12. Whip finish over the folded foam tie-down spot.
