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Message From the President

I'm writing this column in July, nearly three weeks after the horrific floods in Kerrville and the surrounding rivers in the Texas Hill Country. Officials announced the week of July 23, that they will move from rescue to recovery mode. We all remember the heartbreaking stories about the loss of so many lives, especially those little girls at Camp Mystic in Hunt.

The loss of life, property and livelihoods is staggering as is the destruction of the river habitat for many miles along the Guadalupe will take years to recover. But let's not forget the flooding effects in towns near the Llano, San Gabriel and other nearby rivers.

As a fly fishing club, what should our response be?

Our club is part of the FFI Texas Council. The presidents of all the Texas fly fishing clubs are in constant communication (including those clubs in the most affected areas) to keep each other abreast of efforts that clubs or the Council can consider supporting or participating.

Early in the catastrophe, the need was great for qualified search-and-rescue volunteers. But now that efforts have moved to the recovery mode there will be the need for volunteers to continue helping the local community with the clean up.

Also, there are many ways to donate funds including:

- Central Texas Community Foundation
- Community Foundation of the Texas Hill Country
- Austin Disaster Relief Network

We will continue to keep close to the issue to see what makes sense for our club's response. In the meantime, if you have any ideas or questions, please let me or any of our board members know.





August, Casting Clinic

Club, it is time for the annual Casting Clinic. But guess what? It's HOT!! Extremely hot!! So, the idea of having a Casting Clinic at 5 pm does not appeal to many of us. So, we are going to beat the heat by moving the Casting Clinic to Saturday, August 9th. Starting at 8 am and ending around 11 am. We also want a location closer to where the majority of our members live, that has water nearby for additional casting practice, no trees, and better parking. Well, I think we found a park that meets all of those needs as well.

Our location for the Casting Clinic will be the North Park in Haltom City. Recently renovated, this park is very clean, well-maintained for casting, and meets all of our needs. And there is fishing available for those who want to after the Clinic, and Fossil Creek runs along the border of the park, for the creek fanatics!!

In addition to using the Fly Casting Skills Development Program, we will focus on roll casting on the water and casting from different levels. Both of these techniques are critical to creek fishing and will improve your casting and angling skills.

What should I bring? Dress accordingly. Sun protection. Hydration method of choice. Good casting rod and line. Suggest a 6-weight or more, but not necessary.

Oklahoma Trip, September 5-7

We will go to Oklahoma and fish with one of our favorite guides, Donavan Clary. Coincidentally, he is also our speaker for the September meeting. We will be fishing the Illinois River for smallmouth bass and trout. This is a guided trip with Donavan and his guides. We will stay in a hotel there and go out with them on Saturday and Sunday.

Because we are using guides, there is a cost of \$150 per angler for them. They will provide flies and leaders if needed. You will need to bring a fly rod. Donavan recommends a 5wt, 6wt, or 7wt. The cost includes a day float trip. Also, on the days you are not floating, a guide will be available for wade fishing with a group. So this is a really great deal!

I am working on the schedule for the float trips, so please let me know which day you'd like to go. Donavan has made the entire weekend available. Let me know Friday, Saturday, or Sunday.

Also, Donavan is going to cook out for us on Friday night at his place. He'll have hamburgers and sausages. Just bring your chair and beverage of choice. Also, bring sunblock and mosquito spray. At this time, he gives a presentation and goes over the fishing areas as well as flies, techniques, and so forth. We will meet there at 7:00 pm.

Here is the location: 15343 West 925 Rd., Parkhill, Ok 74451

Don't follow the GPS up the hill. First yellow 2-story you see after the turn. We will try to have a sign at the entrance.

Saturday evening, you are invited to meet the FWFF at Big Daddy's on the Dam restaurant. You will be on your own for food and drink. We can gather as friends and share our stories.

We were not able to secure one location for lodging. There is plenty to choose from in the area. There's camping at the State Park. There are RV hookups at Gore Landing. There are rooms at Tenkiller Lodge, just tell them you're with Donavan when booking.

This is a member-only outing.

It is a 4 1/2-hour travel time from Ft Worth to Gore, Oklahoma. It's about a 45-minute drive from Gore to the upper river to fish for smallmouth.

You will need an Oklahoma fishing license. You can get a day pass for \$26.

Please let Dan know if you plan to attend. We need to get a headcount. Also, let him know if you would like to fish for smallmouth on Saturday or Sunday. The trout are in the section below Tenkiller Lake, and the smallmouth are above it.

This is going to be a great trip, so let's go fishing!

Cleats aren't just for football...

Some of my fly-fishing friends call me a human "Billy goat" because I like to climb all over places and do it with reckless abandon in search of fish, especially fish and small places, high and rocky places. When I packed my gear for the Fort Worth Fly Fishers trip in South Fork, Colorado, I took two pairs of wading boots, but none with cleats. Before the game began, I was already at third and long...

On Day Three of the trip, I joined some fellow small creek aficionados, David Crawford and Ted Moore of the Lubbock Flyfishers, who introduced me to some high altitude, difficult to get to streams. We trekked to a creek that is chock full of wild, native cutthroats, and we had a ball right up until 1 o'clock or so as we finished our final casts at a waterfall. Taking pictures, we mused over our surroundings and the fish that we caught, and all settled on the idea of returning to the car to have some lunch, which, afterwards, we'd come back for some more fishing later that afternoon.

Unfortunately, while quickly following David out of the canyon, I learned that the flats booties I wore – the pair with the super-duper gripper that was hailed by Orvis as the grip to end all grips was almost my end. (Note: To be fair to Orvis, these booties work fantastically for saltwater and "level ground" warm-water fishing). Before I knew it, all I remember is my feet sliding skyward, and me seeing blue and clouds. Instantly, I came down hard on my left side near my kidney that it almost took my breath away. I was stunned.

This could've well been the end of the story, but I wasn't hurt all that badly. I shook the stinging pain to my ego, and I was able to manage my way out and up the hill. While sitting in the car eating lunch with Ted and David, I remember thinking, "Wow, I can't believe I did that climb without cleats". Timeout.

I should have planned a better game-day strategy, which is the point of the story (other than "don't do what I did"). If you are going to any place that has slick or wet or uneven rock surfaces, it's best to have a set of boots with cleats that have either been screwed in or are designed to have them, like Korkers, that have a version with changeable inserts for cleats and felt or rubber. You should bring two sets of boots on your fishing trips or if you go to a new fishing area for the first time. Having two different types of boot sets -- one with cleats and the other with either rubber or felt soles -- is especially important for multiple day trips since you will be fishing in different types of water and conditions. Remember, if you fish with a guide in a drift boat, they require uncleated soles.

Whatever you choose, it's a necessary item to have them with you as I have learned in Oklahoma at Beaver's Bend or locally at Possum Kingdom as I have often climbed down the hill to get to the Brazos below the Dam.

Another important accessory for your game plan is a wading staff. Most experienced fly fishers will tell you that the most important thing to carry with you beside your net is a wading staff, especially one that has a strong point and a strong shaft that offers a unbending rod to lean on when you get in trouble or the test or probe places where you might want to tread, but the treading part is really the most important.

A good place to find really good wading boots is at Orvis. According to Orvis Ft Worth Fly Fishing Manager Stephen Woodcock, the Orvis Pro series or Clearwater Boots can be fitted with aftermarket cleats. He suggests PosiGrip™ Screw-In Studs as they are easily screwed in and fit and work best. Or, you can go to Bass Pro or Cabela's to find other wading boot options.

My recommendation is to do a little research and try to find out whether soft metal is better or hard metal. The least expensive way is to






visit a hardware store searching for shorter studs, remember if too long you can penetrate the sole and your foot. Although this solution is better than nothing, there are better options. My understanding is that there's plenty out there.

Remember, don't forget your wading staff and booths with cleats because these two items may save you from a breakneck accident or worse. Good traction is not just for football. If you add cleats, you'll score a better outing.



In Memory of a Friend — A Fly Fisherman, a Warrior, and a Mind Like No Other

This week, the world lost a good man. And those of us who knew him — truly knew him — lost a brother, Karl Froehlich.

He was a fellow fly fisherman. Anyone who's cast a line in the early morning light with him will remember his near-mystical patience. He was there for what the river gave: the stillness, the clarity, and the chance to be outside the chaos.

But that chaos — he understood it more than most. As a political analyst, he saw the moving pieces that the rest of us missed. He could dissect a geopolitical crisis over a black coffee or read between the lines of a news cycle like he was reading sheet music. Insightful, sharp, sometimes cutting — but never cruel. His words were chosen with care, and when he spoke, you listened.

Before all that, he served. Military life shaped him, though he never wore it on his sleeve. He didn't talk about it unless you were quiet long enough for the memories to surface. And even then, they came wrapped in humility. His strength was the quiet kind — a deep current beneath calm water. He didn't seek medals or recognition. He sought purpose.

He was a paradox in the best way: private but warm, intense yet deeply kind, skeptical of most things but loyal without question. You never fully figured him out, and maybe that was the point.

We all have our version of him. A fireside conversation. A long hike in silence. A book he insisted you read. A dry fly, he swore, worked better in the shade. What ties them all together is this: he showed up. When it mattered, he was there, present, listening, thoughtful. And that presence now leaves an ache.

So here's to the friend who never needed to be the loudest in the room. The man who let his character speak for itself. The soldier, the thinker, the fisherman — and the enigma who, in being hard to define, became impossible to forget.

May the river run smooth for him now. And may we keep casting forward, carrying his memory in every drift. I love you, Froehlisimo. Now you will meet Connie in heaven, the love of your life.

Fly of the Month: Redfish Crack Variation

Materials:

- Large Beadchain eyes
- EP Tarantula brush 1" Black
- Crazy legs Black/Purple tipped
- EP Craft fur brush black/purple
- UV resin
- 140 D Black thread
- any saltwater style sproat, stinger will work. I'm using Ahrex NS122 for this one.



1. Attach your beadchain to the hook shank you would like a clouser.



4. Give this 6 really tight and close wraps before tying off and cutting off the excess.



2. Bring your thread down the shank, stopping right before the hook bend.



5. Grab 2 legs, keep them connected; this will make working with them easier, and tie them on one side of the fly.



3. Attach your brush using the wire core of the brush.



6. Bring the other pair of legs around and tie in a similar fashion. Trim the legs to be as long as the tail.

7. Behind the eyes, attach your Tarantula brush.



9. Whip your fly.



8. Give the brush 3 wraps behind the eyes before cutting off the tag



10. Secure the threads around the eye of the hook and the beadchain with UV resin. Once you do this, the fly is complete.


