February Speaker – Danny Scarborough

He specializes in client trips targeting Bow Fin in the Conroe/Huntsville area and Alligator Gar in the lower Trinity River. One of the largest Alligator Gar he caught weighed 83 pounds!

He is an experienced fly fishing guide with 15 years of fly fishing under his belt offering guided fly fishing trips around Texas for largemouth, smallmouth, Guadalupe and spotted bass, sunfish, white bass, striped bass, crappie, carp, freshwater drum, bowfin, gar and even catfish in the greater Dallas/Fort Worth/Houston areas.



March Speaker – Doc Thompson, High Country Anglers, Taos, NM

Planning a trip to fish Northern New Mexico this year? If not, you will be hearing our March speaker. Doc Thompson started High Country Anglers in 1995 thinking he could make a living as a fly-fishing guide in New Mexico. Thirty years and thousands of guide trips later he is still alive and guiding. Doc worked many summers at the Philmont Scout Ranch in the 1980s and early 1990s then moved to Northern New Mexico after graduating from the University of Missouri. He started HCA based on his passion for fly fishing, trout, and New Mexico; all with customer service.

Doc's patience, calm demeanor, fun nature, and professionalism are reasons he has many returning customers to fly fish in New Mexico. He loves to boost the learning curve, share new tricks with "old dogs" and expand fly fishing horizons. It is often the experience and the journey of fishing that leads to the most memorable days. As Doc says, "All guides love to fish, but I also love to guide."

Doc is the longest operating Orvis Endorsed Fly Fishing Guide in New Mexico. He has been honored as the Orvis Fly Fishing Guide of the Year and Orvis Fly Tier of the Year. He's been a finalist for the Orvis Fly Fishing Guide of the Year in 2012, 2014 and 2017. Doc presents seminars on fly fishing, fly selection and other fly-fishing educational programs to fly shops and fly-fishing clubs throughout the country. He volunteers throughout Northern New Mexico. He has served two consecutive terms as President of the local Enchanted Circle Trout Unlimited (ECTU) and is a current ECTU board member. He started and volunteers for ECTU's Trout Warriors program using fly fishing as a form of healing for US Military Disabled Veterans. When not in New Mexico he is exploring throughout South America and hosts saltwater trips to the Yucatan in the winter months.

A sandwich buffet—with all the fixings—gave everyone the chance to warm up, swap stories, and welcome our newest members. Nolan River Outing – March 28 – Mark Your Calendar for the Sand Bass Run

March is time for one of our favorite outings on the Nolan River near Blum. White bass will start running up into the creeks and rivers here in North Texas. The Nolan River runs from the Cleburne area into the Brazos River above Lake Whitney, and in the spring is actually one of the prettiest areas to fish. With the blue bonnets and redbud trees blooming, the river runs through limestone rocks and cliff formations, which really add to the white bass run experience. But the old saying, that if the red buds aren't blooming, then it's not time yet. We shall see.

Peak time is mid-March through early April, so March the 28th is right in that time zone. We will meet in Blum, a small town south of Cleburne, at the Conoco Station on highway 933. Plan to meet here at 6:30 am. They know we are coming and will have hot breakfast treats and coffee for us to enjoy. We will have a brief meeting to discuss the day and suit up before heading down to the access point. Parking here is a challenge, as we are parking on the sides of the road. Be extremely careful doing so, as traffic does not slow down much. Also suggest carpooling!! This will reduce down the number of vehicles parking here. When the word gets out that conditions are good, this will be an immensely popular place to go.

As far as gear goes, suggest the following:

- 3 to 5 weight rods. 7-to-9-foot rods work best
- Small minnow type flies. Clousers, woolly buggers, etc. Bring variety in colors. Small Flies are best.
- Good footwear, with grip. It could be muddy around the river and on trails. NO felt!!!
- Walking staff very handy
- Protective eye and head gear

As the action slows down some, or hunger pains start to set in, there is relief in Cleburne! Lunch at the Burger Bar really hits the spot. They know we are coming too!! Plan is to start showing up at around 1pm. Highly suggest calling in your order as you head that way. This will speed up the process, and ensure there is little time waiting. 817-645-9021. Fly of the Month



Flys for the Blue River

Ethan Lovelace, biologist at the Blue River Public Fishing and Hunting Area would report on January 20: Elevation is normal and stable, water temperature 40°F and clear. Rainbow trout good on caddis flies, midges, nymphs, around brush structure, channels, creek channels, river channel, river mouth, and rocks.

Please note that the area we fish is open to fly fishing and bait casting so you will see a whole array of fishing gear. However, I would add to Ethan's suggestions by telling you to go small and go deep. Every once in a while a brief hatch will happen when a small caddis or adams will bring trout up. However the surest bet is to use small 18 to 24 midges and nymphs. Some of my personal favorites are the Eggstacy Egg, Mercury Zebra Midge, and RS2 set up on a euro nymphing rig or running deep under an indicator. Or if you prefer you can pull a streamer like the old work horse Wooly Bugger or float the popular Blue River Mop Fly. My personal favorites, the ones I never leave home without and that have been most productive for me on the Blue, are simple to tie and effective: Eggstacy Egg, Mercury Zebra Midge, and RS2.

Bead: 3.0mm slot tungsten silver

Thread: Uni 8/0 pink

Body: Eggstasy, salmon pink

RS2

Hook: # 18 to 22 Tiemco 101

Thread: Gray 8/0 Uni-Thread

Tail: Dun Bett's Tailing Fibers

Abdomen: Natural beaver fur (I use muskrat)

Wing: Gray saddle hackle

Thorax: Natural beaver fur (I use muskrat)

Let's take a look at how to tie my version of the **Mercury Zebra Midge**

Originator: Pat Dorsey

Tier: Brett Morehead

Hook: # 18 to 22 Tiemco 2487

Bead: Clear silver-lined glass (Hobby Lobby)

Thread: Black 6/0

Rib: Silver Ultra Wire (extra fine)

Abdomen: Black 6/0

Collar: Black Superfine

Fly of the Month: Mercury Zebra Midge



Start by placing your hobby lobby glass bead on a #20 nymph hook and secure in vise.



Use 6/0 black thread. Tie in a jam knot behind the bead. Then tie in the silver wire and run thread bead back to the bend.



Next run the thread back up to the bead and then wrap the silver wire up to the bead, creating segments.



Apply dubbing to thread, my preference is natural muskrat, get a couple wraps and then whip finish. Brush out to get that buggy look and your done.

Now Let's Go Fish!!!
